

I've been here with little kids at camp, watch them as they get older, have summer romances, go home, go to college and return as staff and volunteers again.

Our campers live in a community of laughter, talent shows, archery, swimming, horseback riding, games, art, nature walks, meals and snacks in the dining hall and a good night's sleep in our cabins.

We have a small lake, boating, and the peace that nature and companionship brings. In my volunteer gig, I sort and pass meds, bandage cuts and scrapes, take the sting out of a sunburn, or ice up a knee that suddently met the pavement. I don't get a lot of rest. Rest is overrated in the hills.

She regaled her audience with historic tales about Stalin's anti-Dmitri Shostakovich antics, dealings between Gustav Mahler and Sigmund Freud, and Richard Wagner and King Ludwig II.

She explained to the crowd that many of the actors who perform in her symphonic plays also work as readers for audio books. They have just the kind of voice, and patience, that is required to work with a symphony orchestra in performance.

1. I grew up in Arkansas but have sadly lost my southern accent.


