LAST MEETING



Our double whammy duo, Victoria Zackheim and Anne Perry presented a wealth of information based on Anne's extensive writing history. Anne offered her knowledge and tips to help the audience better understand and expand stories, providing readers a reason to keep turning the

page - all the way to the last sentence of the book.

A few topics touched upon:



 When creating your characters, remember that everybody is vulnerable somehow or other. What could

you do to reach them? How would they react to adversity? What are his relationships and how do those relationships affect him?

- Build tension every step of the way with interesting characters. Make use of secrets, humiliation, embarrassment.
- Remember, even bad guys have something good about them. Give your readers a reason to care about what happens next. Why do people do what they do? Use your own experience and figure it out.

Perry writes pages of outline full of details in chapters and scenes before she starts on the manuscript - often writing ten drafts of her outline.

Ellen Sussman "Fiction: Truth or Lies"

The New York Times bestselling author of four novels, A Wedding in Provence, The

Paradise Guest House, French Lessons, and On a Night Like This, Sussman is also the editor of two critically acclaimed anthologies, Bad Girls: 26 Writers Misbehave and Dirty Words: A Literary Encyclopedia of Sex. She teaches through Stanford Continuing Studies and in private classes.

<u>Ellen Sussman</u>'s novels are not autobiographical. Yet she claims that by writing other people's stories, she can get closer to her own truth. In this presentation, she'll talk about how we as writers can transform life stories into fiction. She'll also discuss ways in which we can dig deep to write more substantial fiction and memoir.



Upton Sinclair both disrupted and documented his era. The impact of his most famous work, The Jungle, would merit him a place in American history had he never written another book. Yet he wrote nearly eighty more, publishing most of them himself. What Sinclair did was both simple and profound: he committed his life to helping people of his era understand how society was run, by whom and for whom. His aim was nothing less than to "bury capitalism under a barrage of facts," as Howard Zinn describes it.

Upton Sinclair introduced himself to American readers in 1906 with the publication of The Jungle, his exposé of the meat packing industry. He was only 25 years old. For the next six decades, he would remain an unconventional, often controversial, and always innovative character in American life. He was also a filmmaker, a labor activist, a women's rights advocate, and a health pioneer on the grandest scale-



a lifetime surprisingly relevant for twenty-first century Americans.

A hundred years ago, investigative journalism was just being conceived, and Sinclair's undercover reporting on the conditions in a meat packing plant may have been its birthing moment. Filmmaking was beginning to change the way stories were told and how people gained access to

information. His friends were experimenting with sexual freedom and birth control, but the shadow of alcoholism was beginning to take its toll in the radical community, and Sinclair would record his own assessment of the dangers of alcohol in his novel-and later film-The Wet Parade.

Flash/Short Fiction

It's the writer's call with this new merged category. Test your skill in composing a Flash Fiction piece, or choose the standard Short Fiction format - your choice! Entries may be no longer than 1,500 words.



Poetry Interpret the theme creatively in a poem up to 40 lines in length.

Creative Non-Fiction

This is a brand new category this year, by popular demand! Tell any true story within the theme with a personal story, personal essay, or memoir up to 1,500 words.

Rebecca Levy Delivers!

I was sitting in my office when a middle-aged patient came in, tears in her eyes. I was not unused to patients in various stages of emotional distress in my consultation room, often there for help with some physical, emotional or health- related issue. I stopped typing at my computer keyboard to give her my full



attention. "What can I help you with?" I asked?

"It's just so SO sad!" She said. She looked down. I offered her tissues. I stared at her curiously, trying to discern if she was going to continue on with her story, which I assumed would include some explanation of what medical or family issue

was in need of my attention, when I realized she was holding the book in her hand.

By "The Book", I mean the Napa Writers Anthology book, which I was so lucky to have been a contributor to. I suddenly realized she was referring to MY piece in the book, which, indeed was, SO SAD. I wasn't sure if I should thank her for reading (or buying) it, or ask if there was something I could do to help her get over her grief.

Since that day, I have had calls and text messages and emails from people– patients, friends and family– complimenting the book, asking where they can read more of these talented authors' works, and wanting to purchase the book for themselves.

I decided to put it on display in my office (Premier ObGyn Napa Inc, located at 3030 Beard Rd in Napa) so people could read it while sitting in the waiting area. It has been a great "tease", since no one waits in my waiting room long enough to read more than two pieces. They often end up wanting more. They either purchase one right there on the spot or go to Amazon and buy one (or more– for friends and family).

Being able to discuss my interest in writing, my passion for my work, and having written a true story that people find moving enough to bring to my attention during their office visits has brought a whole new dimension to my life, as a physician and now, as a medical memoirist!
