his Bachelor's and Master's degrees, relocating back to the Bay Area in 2008, where he lives with his wife and two sons. His autobiographical novel, *Junkie Love*, chronicles his battle with drugs and was published by Battered Suitcase (2010).


- 2. Receive, post and deposit money for meeting fees, dues, workshops, and other income, keeping copies of all checks and banking forms.
- 3. Prepare and sign checks, oversee debit card use and balance income and expenses monthly on designated forms, retaining documentation of all expenses.
- 4. Monitor subscriptions and automatic renewals of various online services, e.g., Constant Contact, eScrip, GoDaddy, MeetUp, PayPal, and WordPress.
- 5. Membership Dues
 - a. Notify Membership Chair of all membership dues received.
 - b. Enter payment data on CWC Member Record Management System (MRMS) for new and renewing members as needed.
 - c. Make payments of dues to CWC regularly.
- 6. Regularly monitor activity of bank, PayPal, and eScrip accounts.
- 7. Monitor passwords for all online accounts.
- 8. Prepare Monthly Financial Reports as requested by the board:
 - a. Budget Comparison against actual income and expenses
 - b. Balance Sheet*
 - c. Income Sheet*
 - d. Expense Sheet*
 - e. Monthly Bank Statement*
 - f. Such other financial reports of NVW activity requested by the board or deemed useful by the treasurer.
 - *These are required as quarterly reports by the CWC.
- 9. Prepare Quarterly Financial Reports as prescribed by CWC.
- 10. Assist board and officers, as directed, in preparing and monitoring of budgets and managing NVW's finances.
- 11. Attend NVW board meetings and monthly membership meetings (or designate someone to collect and record monies).
- 12. Keep copies of any correspondence with members, creditors or other organizations.

Each year Arts Council Napa Valley produces a monthlong campaign to promote our local talents and bring our community together through live music, art fairs and exhibitions, storytelling, theatre performances, culinary arts, and hands on activities.



All About Litquake 2018

From Litstock to Litquake

Originally hatched over beers at the Edinburgh Castle pub in 1999, Litstock debuted as a free one-day reading series in a fog-bound Golden Gate Park. Local writers Jane Ganahl and Jack Boulware realized quickly that booklovers craved something grander. Against the backdrop of a technology-crazed San Francisco, writers were still drawn to the city, and readers still appreciated the written word.

In 2002, the festival was rechristened Litquake, and began expanding its programming to include all elements of the Bay Area literary scene. Taking a cue from a USA Today report that San Franciscans spend twice the nation's average on books and booze, in 2004, the festival inaugurated an immediately successful closing night Lit Crawl bacchanal throughout the city's Mission District.

Popular demand drove Litquake to expand even further, adding more national and international authors,


